Farming in Bretherton – Andy’s farming blog

Well our traditional wet winter has caught up with us. Our porch has become a combination of wet dogs, muddy welly boots and the farm cat looking through the window wishing it too was a dog. "Bag-in" time or "brew" time to most people, somehow seems to get longer through the winter months as we find longer topics to discuss in the warmth, usually politics!

A fantastic Autumn allowed the drilling of next year’s crops to run smoothly and most farmers in the area got finished before the rains came. Grass kept growing allowing livestock extra outdoor grazing time and extra cuts of silage to be made for the over winter feeds.

Even Forage Maize which is one of the later harvested crops was chopped and cleared without too much mess being made. Various ditches and brooks are being cleaned, unfortunately not by the Environment Agency yet, Wymott and Lostock would be a start.

Some fields have been left for spring sowing allowing manures to be stockpiled and spread in spring unless there is some frosty weather beforehand.

At home we have dropped the oil seed rape crop from our rotation after almost 40 years of growing it, being plagued with pigeon damage from above and slug damage from below. The ongoing restrictions of chemistry to grow the crop successfully has become a challenge not worth pursuing at the moment. We have replaced the area with milling wheat this year, maybe we could get some Bretherton Buns in the bakerySimon?

So the hatches are battened down, we are confined to yard duties, cleaning and bagging grain, machinery maintenance in the workshop and fixing that broken gutter!

Hopefully the local turkeys are getting plump and the pigs are snug in their blankets ready for the big day ! On that note I wish everyone a content and peaceful Christmas in the warmth of your homes without too much of the wet stuff!

The way PACT is delivered has changed to meet the needs of local communities and make best use of technology to make PACT more accessible. It can be difficult for you to physically attend a meeting during the evening, when you might have other commitments or find it difficult to get transport. E-PACT, has recently been introduced, where virtual meetings are held online and also mixing physical with online meetings either on Facebook or using new products such as Google Hangouts.

What has the Parish Council been doing on your behalf recently?

During 2016, the Parish Council has been working towards implementing the key issues from the Transport Survey the process has been slow and resources are limited but initially a short list is being taken forward. These are,

- Improvement of the Pedestrian link between Bretherton and Croston;
- Restricting the use of Sarah Lane and Back Lane as routes for through traffic;
- Introduction of a 3.5 Tonne vehicle weight restriction on South Road and North Road;
- Maintenance of footways, including frontage hedges
- Exploring the alternatives to replace the public transport services
- Exploring the possibility of opening up the link between the Blue Anchor and the Recreation Ground.

Some of these issues will be less easy to achieve than others because they are dependent upon decisions at County level or by neighbouring Parish councils but we will continue to press for suitable solutions on behalf of the village.

The public meeting in May gave us a mandate to enable the refurbishments to the War Memorial to take place. The initial work has been completed to repair the frost and water damage thanks to Brian Anderton and to Stephen Wignall for the cutting back of the hedges. Further work will be undertaken when planning permission is granted for the removal and pruning of the surrounding trees. Further work on opening up the site will commence after the trees have been removed.

In May it was agreed that commemorative mugs should be given to all the 0 – 4 children living in the village and all those children attending the school in Years R to 6 on 11th June 2016 to celebrate the Queen's official birthday.

110 mugs were given out by the school and a further 25 to pre school age children and those under 11 attending other schools.

The village playground is always popular with families and the Parish council carries out weekly inspections throughout the year to enable any problems to be recognised early and corrected. The whole site undergoes a ROSPA standard inspection every year as is required by our insurers. The annual inspection serves to help the Parish Council to prioritise certain aspects of maintenance before issues arise. This year Chorley Council helped us by replacing some cracked paving and decking planks, they also arranged for the tractor to be painted and gave us special playground quality bark chippings to replenish the barked areas. We are also hoping to have some of the matting replaced in the near future. As part of our weekly checks we also check the Defibrillator which is on the Institute wall.

What a busy first term at Bretherton! I would like to thank everyone for their kind words of welcome and I look forward to being able to share with you, our amazing experiences. All children and staff have settled back into the routines of school and it was a great first half term with the good weather meaning we could make full use of our field right up until the end of October.

Our sporting involvement has continued and we have participated in Athletics, Kurling and Boccia alongside other schools.

We held a Harvest celebration in St John the Baptist Church. The children wrote prayers to support equality and to eradicate poverty around the world, such insightful thoughts from the adults of the future.

Our children have the opportunity to be involved in many after school and lunch time clubs. Our teachers and visitors offer Spanish, games club, football, sewing for KS1 and KS2, Wild outdoors and many more. This term we had a very successful friendship week. Children learned about how to be a good friend, how to resolve differences and how to celebrate differences as well as similarities. Wild outdoors came in to promote working as a team, Relax Kids came into school to help children manage their emotions, in particular anxiety and worry, the police came in to discuss conflict resolution and Nippon UK about the effects of bullying on self esteem and emotions. Year 6 were invited to attend an 'Author Roadshow' led by Chris Riddell. They listened to how he gets his ideas for writing and how important the editing process is. They have been influenced by this and have shown those skills in their work linked to WW1.

Our Ethos group, hosted a Remembrance Day assembly independently (their first time) and it was a huge success. An hour packed full of remembrance, poems, songs and thoughts of the sacrifices that were made. They also asked children for their dreams of peace which was lovely as they unified in the fact that wars don't solve anything. At the end of November we had our Christmas Fair... it is always surprising how quickly we get into the Christmas spirit! Children opened it with carols around the tree which was special and a few of our children were presented with certificates by the Brain and Spine Foundation as they won a national competition to design their Christmas cards. What talented children!
